Sunday Services

Sunday, January 7 – Rev. Fred Howard, “What Can Dicken’s *A Christmas Carol* Teach Us Today?”

In part, Dickens wrote his famous novella *A Christmas Carol* as a screed against the economic injustices created by the Industrial Revolution. Today’s social and economic landscape is quite different – though the inequalities are more with us than ever. How well do the lessons of the story translate into the world we inhabit today? This morning I’ll share some thoughts on this question.

Sunday, January 14 - Rev. George Bennett, “HEAVEN”

Heaven is first of all now and therefore surely later. My friend Richard Rohr says, "If God loves and accepts us now in our broken state, why would the divine policy change after our death?" I believe the Original Blessing of God is the positive direction to our existence. We can trust the primary flow of life and eventually we will learn to calmly rest there. We can actually become a conduit of love. Ilia Delio says that "heaven is not a place of eternal rest or a long sleep-in, but a life of creativity and newness in love; one with God in the transformation of all things."

Sunday, January 21 – Rev. Fred Howard, “Dr. King’s Economic Dream”

One of the first things that comes to mind when we hear Dr. King’s name is his “I Have a Dream” speech. As eloquent and inspiring as that speech was, it by no means does justice to the vast sweep of his vision and ministry. He saw the civil rights movement as inextricably tied to economic rights. His thinking on economic issues was remarkably prophetic. This morning I’ll elaborate.

Christopher D. Sims, Fairhope, AL, guest speaker

Christopher Sims will be speaking about Black Lives Matter, his experiences in Charlottesville, VA, and the spirit of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.

Christopher D. Sims is a musical artist and poet, previously based in Rockford, IL, but recently relocated to Fairhope, AL. He is a community organizer and a human rights activist. He has been involved in the UU Young Adults for Climate Justice and the Diverse Revolutionary UU Multicultural Ministries (DRUUMM) leadership. He is on the advisory board for the Food Justice Ministry, which organized and implements the Ethical Eating: Food and Environmental Justice Statement of Conscience, which was passed by the General Assembly in 2011. He was a member of the UUA Nominating Committee.

Ministerial Musings

January 2018 Ministerial Musings



There are many different ideas out there about what makes for good leadership. An effective leader is often thought of as a person with certain skill sets, or someone with intelligence, courage, self-confidence, etc. But Edwin Friedman, author of *A Failure of Nerve*, says effective leadership is not about traits or skills but comes from the person that is clear about her or his own self goals and values apart from the pressure of others – a state he calls self-differentiation. The self-differentiated leader is one that understands where she or he ends and others begin. Friedman's teachings were a part of what is called "systems theory." It's a revolutionary way to understand ourselves in relationship to the groups and organizations of which we're a part.

According to our seventh principle we're a part of the interdependent web of all existence. Nothing defines us better as human beings than our relationships – our relationships to nature, to other human beings, and to ourselves. The importance of functioning in a healthy way in those relationships can't be overemphasized. The quality of our relationships very much determines the quality of our lives. Systems thinking offers us a way to do just that – function in healthier ways. And remarkably, when we begin to incorporate the theory into our lives, the systems we are a part of – our families, our workplaces, our congregations – often begin to function in healthier ways also. This is the essence of what Friedman calls leadership through self-differentiation.

Beginning mid-January I plan to offer a ten week course in systems thinking using the book *Extraordinary Relationships: A New Way of Thinking About Human Interactions* by Roberta Gilbert. I hope that some of the leadership of our congregation will take advantage of this class offering. But you don't necessarily have to be a leader to benefit. Anyone interested in improving the quality of her or his relationships may find this paradigm of inestimable value. As the class size will be limited, please contact me if you have interest.
